At the Hospital Education Service, we recognise more than most, the impact that poor health can have on attendance.

I want to thank all of our parents and carers for your support in working with us to improve your child's attendance by reducing barriers and sharing the positive messaging around the importance of regular attendance on achieving positive outcomes.

Our percentage of severe absence has reduced from 22% last year to 7% this year so far, as a result of your support (severe absence is defined as attendance that falls below 50%).

HOLOCAUST MUSEUM AND MEMORIAL VISIT REPORT

On Wednesday 7th February Year 10 and Year 11 Whitmore Park Annexe students along with staff members Mrs Sykes, Ms Griffin, Ms Dhillon, Ms Ingram and Mr Ley visited the Holocaust Memorial Centre in Newark. We were met with a very engaging and informative educator called Charlie who showed us around the centre. During our visit we walked around the Holocaust memorial gardens and saw a range of memorial statutes, including Anne Frank and also numerous rose plants & individual plaques that have been placed there by family members who lost loved ones in the Holocaust. The students also placed a pebble on a pile that represents the number of children killed in the Holocaust. We also saw the pillar below- under which lies soil from six Nazi Death camps.





The first indoor exhibition we visited was called 'The Journey' –This was an interactive exhibition taking us through a series of rooms including a home, a street and we even sat in a Nazi run school. It told us the story of Leo, a fictional German– Jewish boy living in Berlin during Nazi rule and not only detailed Leo's experience but also that of children who lived during the Holocaust and survived.

The final exhibition we visited was the main 'Holocaust exhibition.' Here we learnt about the roots and early History of anti-Semitism and how it was far from just the Nazis who persecuted the Jews in history. We also explored Hitler's rise to power and how anti semitic treatment of Jewish people increased and worsened over time, culminating in the horror of death camps. We saw a range of interesting original photographs and artefacts including death camp uniforms including a wine goblet which was used by a former SS member.

Our students were engrossed throughout the day and asked some pertinent questions as well as answering questions very thoughtfully and sensitively. Although a harrowing period in our history, it was a very informative and thought provoking trip. Thank you to all students and staff who attended.

NEW LAPTOP DEVICES FOR PUPILS ARE DIGITALLY DELIGHTFUL

The school has recently been on a journey of ICT transformation. We were the lucky beneficiaries of 20 brand new devices from the CovConnects team. The laptops will be used by pupils across the service to support them throughout their education journey. The new devices are particularly special as they can be used as laptops and also tablet devices. The mutli functional use will make it easier for pupils to quickly access online material as the new technology makes the login process faster.

The CovConnects team has been set up to support residents of Coventry to access digital technologies in order to improve. The digital inclusion team has been working with partners around the city to set up digital community hubs to reduce digital exclusion. As we now live in an increasingly online world, the work of the CovConnects team has been integral in getting people online with the latest technologies.

Somer in Year 11 told us 'The new laptops have been great as they are flexible to use and they make it easier to research on the internet during lessons. The touchscreen is fantastic and this makes it easier to scroll through and find information easily. They are quicker to load up and I find them very easy to use! I have also been using the laptops for exam revision and this will be particularly handy in the coming weeks.'







SCIENCE IN ACTION - WARWICK UNIVERSITY

Pupils studying GCSE Science were in for a treat as they took part in an enrichment day filled with speakers, workshops and exciting experiments. The 'GCSE in Action' day hosted at the University of Warwick is organised for pupils from across the region to hear from industry experts on different areas of science. This year pupils were particularly impressed by talks from Dr Tishtrya Mehta, an astrophysicist who specialises in helioseismology, the study of the 'music' made by stars like the Sun. Dr Alex Baker, an organic chemist with a particular interest in carbohydrates, polymers and nanoparticles. His work is used to design medical diagnostics with a particular focus on the developing world and fighting health inequalities.

Pupils came away from the day feeling inspired and motivated. It was a valuable experience for them all to have a taste of what University lectures are like. On the way back Miss Glenn overheard pupils' mature conversations about deextinction. 'Could we bring back the Dodo?' and 'I want to be a scientist!'

We will be planning to attend more Science in Action days in the future! Thank you to Miss Glenn for putting on this wonderful opportunity for our pupils.

PUPILS MAKE A SPLASH IN OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Following on from last year's success Outdoor Education continues to grow in strength and pupils have been embracing a raft of new activities on Wednesday afternoons. So far this year pupils have to experienced kayaking, climbing, countryside walking and sailing. The weekly sessions offer pupils' the opportunity to further enhance their knowledge of the outdoors and to garner a love for our natural environments right here on our doorstep.

There have been many highlights including students changing kayaks (musical chair style) mid-channel at Coventry canal basin, Hayden beating Mr Green in a kayaking race, Somer climbing the wall at Warwick University three times in quick succession! However everyone is agreed that the pinnacle of this year has been the sailing course at Draycote Reservoir this term. Within the first session, pupils were tasked with navigating the reservoir independently and quickly showed their sea legs as they sailed the perimeter without capsizing!

We caught up with Freya from Year 10 who has been part of Outdoor Education since September. She told us 'It has been really enjoyable being part of the Outdoor Education group. My favourite activity has been sailing as it has given me a sense of adventure that I have never experienced before. In a short space of time, I have learnt to rig a boat and use the equipment on board to sail around Draycote Reservoir. Climbing, at Warwick University was also fun. The climbing wall was exciting and over the weeks I was able to beat the boys to the top! Well done Freya and we look forward to hearing from you in the Summer term.

As we move forwards into the summer term we are aiming to arrange a course on padel tennis. The relatively new sport, which is a combination of squash and tennis, will offer an exciting opportunity for pupils to experience a new racquet sport. The sport is growing in the UK having made its debut in Spain.

For any students who might be at a loose end during the summer holidays, Mercia Canoe Club would welcome new members. You just need turn up at Coventry Canal basin on Saturday afternoon, all the details are on their website. I believe its £3 per session. Warwick University's climbing wall is available for sessions and Draycote Reservoir run sailing courses for students and their families. Further information is on the provider's website.

SEA LIFE CENTRE GIVES PUPILS DEPTHS OF UNDERWATER KNOWLEDGE

To celebrate British Science Week, pupils from HES visited the National Sea Life Centre - Birmingham. This was the perfect opportunity to enrich students understanding of Biology. We explored habitats, food chains, adaptation, communities, competition, biodiversity and conservation all whilst observing the animals.

This was a popular trip where our students experienced touching a living starfish. It was described as rough and hard and a bit spiky. Some pupils experienced UK's only 360 degree tunnel for the first time where we marvelled at sharks, giant turtles and rays. We watched UK's first sea otters – Ozzy and Ola at feeding time. The penguins put on the best performance this year; It was fascinating to see these creatures close up and we could observe and describe how these animals have adapted to survive in their environment.

A fantastic time was had by all and pupils described it as a really positive experience despite having to do a little bit of work!

Staff would like to congratulate all students on this trip, their behaviour and cooperation was impeccable and they were an absolute pleasure to take to the Sea Life Centre.

TIGGER HAS PUPILS BARKING FOR MORE!



How has the course been? What have been the highlights?

Step into the World of Work has been interesting. It has helped me to broaden my knowledge on employability and understand what employers look for. As part of the course, I have had work experience at the RSPCA and the British Heart Foundation.

RSPCA and the British Heart Foundation sound interesting, tell us a little more?

My role at the RSPCA was one day a week and during that time I learnt to train dogs, clean kennels, and support with general animal care. I remember one day, two dogs started fighting and I had to use treats to split them up and calm the situation. All in all, It was an eye-opening experience and really gave me a good insight into the care and welfare of different animals.

I've now moved to the British Heart Foundation and currently working at the City Centre branch. In my role here, I support with tagging and steaming clothes ready for reselling. Greeting and supporting customers whilst on site and general retail duties. It's much busier but I enjoy the hustle and bustle it comes with.

What are you plans for the future?

From September onwards, I am hoping to start a Supported Internship course and looking to specialise in Carpentry. I am awaiting a placement but hoping to be placed somewhere local for me to do this.

What advice would you give to pupils in Year 11, that will be moving on?

Enjoy the time that you have with the service as it will fly past. Focus on your exams and revise so you feel well prepared. Try your hardest in the exams and don't look back with regret. When I look back, I now feel like I made the right decision to move to Adult Education and I am grateful to my teachers for all their advice.
