An InspirED Choice!



The three spires in our new name and logo celebrate our city's heritage as well as representing the three core elements of our service: our school at University Hospital C&W; our Home Tuition Service and our Pupil Referral Unit at Whitmore Park Annexe.

The blue ribbon in our logo boasts Coventry's proud connections to the ribbon weaving industry as well as our pride for our city's football team: Coventry City FC.

And finally, the reference to 'Pathways' in our new name represents the bespoke and flexible nature of our service and the important part we play in supporting children with their learning journey, reconnecting them with all that is wonderful about learning, during and/or after a period of illness and injury.

Our Values as a service are now underpinned by the word **SPIRE**: **S**uccess, **P**erseverance, **I**ntegrity, **R**espect and **E**mpathy. These are values we hold dear as a school community and as citizens of Coventry and beyond.



ICHEME VISIT IGNITES INTEREST IN PUPILS STUDYING SCIENCE

Pupils from WPA were invited to the Big Bang on Location event, hosted by the Institute of Chemical Engineers (IChemE) in Rugby. It was an exciting day packed with hands-on challenges, where students' problem-solving skills and perseverance were put to the test in a practical engineering workshop.

During the workshop, students had the opportunity to build a coffee machine, enabling them to gain real-world insight into the engineering process. The event also provided students an avenue to engage with undergraduates from Swansea University, who shared their experiences and answered questions about their journey into studying chemical engineering.







For the rest of the visit, we explored the many interactive exhibits run by over 15 various companies (just some listed below): Understanding the engineers' role with food – Britvic, understanding precision engineering to design a marble run – icheme engineers, which engineer will you be? – Engineering UK, LEGO technic and tomato ketchup production line – Peter Swanson (chemical engineer, problem solving in boat design and promotion of the apprenticeship route – icheme staff and manufacturing technology. Pupils made the most of this visit engaging with exhibitors – asking questions and challenging themselves with tasks given.

It was an inspiring day that sparked curiosity and gave students a deeper understanding of the field!

SILVERSTONE VISIT IS WHEELIE GOOD FUN

In December, pupils visited Silverstone Museum. We spent some time learning about the history of the site and the development from an RAF base into the world famous racing circuit it is today. We had the opportunity to handle genuine F1 car parts from the cars of Lewis Hamilton, Max Verstappen and Roman Brogan, along with learning about the performance of the cars reducing the weight and increasing the performance of the fuel and the aerodynamics.

We also heard about some of the 1.9 million career opportunities linked to the grand prix. This included the roles we would expect, in driving, engineering and manufacturing, but also included roles in marketing, communications and media.

Following our workshop, we had a tour of the track and some free time to explore the museum, where we were able to view racing cars throughout the ages, explore interactive exhibits and experience the 4D cinema show.


WPA IS A PRODUCTIVITY POWERHOUSE ON ENTERPRISE DAY

This year the staff at the Hospital School have put together a Makaton advent calendar which we have displayed in all the paediatric wards this December.

COMPTON VERNEY VISIT HELPS PUT ART INTO PERSPECTIVE

In October pupils studying Art were invited on a visit to Compton Verney Art Gallery. Set in the sprawling countryside of Warwickshire, pupils and staff were treated to a location akin to those seen in the hit TV Show Bridgerton. The site is home to an Art Gallery that had been maintained by the Littlewoods family and amongst its beautiful backdrop serves its patrons through stunning art pieces located within the magnificent Grade 1 listed building.

Pupils enjoyed a sensory exploration through Neopolitan art from 1600 to 1800. Art pieces are brought to life through a sensory journey allowing you to experience scent, sound and touch to enhance your experience of the art on offer. Paintings reflected many faiths and beliefs and became the focus of much discussion and awe.


GCSE Art students had their own themes to research, and pupils found new themes whilst exploring exhibitions. The beautiful jewel-coloured paintings on the ground floor glowed against the dramatic blues and pinks of the walls.

As pupils continued to explore the gallery, the centrepiece attraction was the work of French Artist Louise Bourgeois. Her work explores themes of her difficult childhood, her relationship with her mother, symbolised in spiders, and many other pieces that could be seen as dramatic, thought-provoking and captivating.

The day really allowed pupils to immerse themselves into the art they experienced and took the opportunity to make the most of the guides that helped them to understand the work. Many new facts were gathered, from why mad hatters have that name to symbolism and folk law.













CAN YOU CRACK THE GCHQ CHRISTMAS CHALLENGE?

Every year the GCHQ (UK's intelligence, security and cyber agency) releases a Christmas Challenge which includes a series of tricky puzzles set by some of the country's brightest minds. It could be the first step in your very own journey to a career in espionage.

We regularly catch up with our Alumni to see how life has changed since leaving school. In this edition Mr Takolia caught up with Emmalee Pegler from Class of 2022 as she embarks on her journey towards a career in Medicine.



So, how has life been since leaving Hospital Education?

It has been quite a journey since leaving school. I initially started studying my A levels but then had to defer my year. I have since restarted my A level studies in September 2023 and have really enjoyed it.

What provider did you move onto and what course are you currently studying?

I decided on King Edward VI 6th form college in Nuneaton to study my A levels. I chose Biology, Chemistry and Psychology as my subjects.



How has being an A Level student been? What have been the highlights?

The step up from GCSE to A-Level has been massive and it has been quite a journey adapting to the level of studying you have to do. But it has been great, and I have enjoyed it. You do have tough days but it's important that you remain focused, and you continue to work hard in your studies. The teachers have been great at supporting me to achieve my potential.

For me, a highlight has been the ability to be part of a classroom environment again. It's been great to meet other A level pupils and make new friends in the process. The facilities are excellent and a particular place that I enjoy visiting is the library.

How has the support been from the College and has this been of use to you?

Support has been good from the college, and it has been easy to access. We have a study centre on our campus, and you can visit at any time. Within the centre, there are different levels of support you can access depending on what it is you need.

An example of this was when I needed a specialist chair to support my chronic pain. They quickly identified what it is I needed and arranged for chairs to be available in the classrooms that I needed them in.

I hear you have been involved in after college clubs. Tell us a little more?

At King Edward we have an enrichment session called 'LINC'. This is an opportunity for pupils to choose from a variety of courses or workshops that are based around different skills. I chose to take one up on First Aid and now have First Aid qualification! I also tried crochet, but I just couldn't get on with it! But it was great to meet new friends.

I am looking to join a new session that is based around learning new medical skills. This will help me with my ambition to pursue a career in Medicine.

What are your plans for the coming year? And where are thinking of moving to after 6th form college?

I'm looking forward to second year of 6th Form and finishing my A levels. I really want to look at applying to university and will start to consider my options from September.

What advice would you give to pupils in year 11, that are thinking about studying at college?

Try not to worry about the process of moving to a new destination. At first, I was worried about finding people that I would get on with. But this was all easy, and I have made lots of friends. Everyone feels the same way and pupils all have similar worries. As you get settled, you really enjoy your time there and forget about those initial anxieties. You will come across bumps in the road but remember that there is always support on hand if you need it.

RIAN LEAVES A LEGACY AS HE RETURNS BACK TO SCHOOL

As you can imagine, we have supported many inspirational children with their learning over the years by providing lessons in the home until they are well enough to return to school. Despite incredibly challenging circumstances, one of those children has inspired us all this year with his positivity, resilience and generosity of spirit and is now a national treasure too. Ladies and gentlemen, meet Rian Dodd!

Rian was diagnosed with Rhabdomyosarcoma, a rare form of soft tissue cancer in March 2023 and has had to overcome many challenges in terms of health. The gruelling treatment journey has included a number of hospitals stays, chemotherapy, numerous operations and two amputations. And yes - he's still smiling. Rian's courage is a source of inspiration for so many young people who have to deal with such a life changing diagnosis and serves as a reminder that truly anything is possible.

For most of us, supporting a loved one with a cancer diagnosis would be completely overwhelming, but this has not deterred the Dodd household from doing everything they can to raise awareness of childhood cancer. They have used every opportunity available to them to build awareness and raise money for a charity very close to their hearts: Young Lives Vs Cancer. From a number of media appearances including ITV's This Morning and the Sunday Politics programme on the BBC, Rian has secured local and national hero status. His idea of the 'Toast Challenge' was broadcast through Phil Upton's BBC Radio show and players from Coventry City FC were 'buttered up' to take on the challenge!

More recently, we heard about Rian's accomplishments in the world of cycling. His adapted bike has facilitated his return to the road through the support of the charity: Cyclists Fighting Cancer. Rian wants to continue smashing those sporting milestones and has ambitions to become an accomplished swimmer. He hopes to compete in the Paralympics one day.

Rian had the sweet smell of success as he was the recipient of the Fragrance Shop Christmas card design competition. His design, entitled 'Time to Pud Up the Christmas Tree', was chosen as a greeting card that will be sold on their commercial website for customers to buy alongside their fragrances.

Rian will be missed by all his teachers and staff at InspirED Pathways as he returns to Blue Coat school. We look forward to hearing about all he goes on to achieve in the future.













CAREERS DAY PROVES TO BE A PATHWAY TO SUCCESS

In line with our schools careers programme, we once again hosted our annual Careers Day for pupils in year 11. The day provided our pupils with an opportunity to better understand options available to them once they leave school. Mohammed himself spent time with us at the Hospital School and we were so proud to hear how well he had done since leaving school.
